17. AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 424 OF THE 2007 CODE OF ORDINANCES FOR THE CITY OF ST. CLOUD ENTITLED “TOBACCO.” Mayor Dave Kleis requested to be given the opportunity to voice the opinion of Administration at the conclusion of the Public Hearing. Councilmember Masters introduced this item. At the joint cities meeting held in St. Augusta, T-21 was discussed. Julie Anderson, Family Physician, discussed the initiative and the positive impact a similar ordinance has had in other cities. Average decrease of 25% in smokers (age 18-20) in these cities. Jodi Gertken, Director of Wellness, Centracare Health. Centracare Health has a strong and large commitment in improving the health care of everyone in the community. Strongly supporting and endorsing the campaign. Grassroots effort of other cities have helped lead the way for the state legislature to make a change. Council President Lewis opened the Public Hearing.

Council President Lewis closed the Public Hearing. Mayor Kleis addressed the Council and the community with Administration's recommendation to oppose Tobacco 21. This is not a role of city government. This is a state determination. It is also a constitutional issue. We are a country where we self-determine our representation. A responsibility and a right set down in the 26th Amendment of our constitution which sets the voting age at age 18. If we do not entrust individuals we have given that right to by our constitution, then we are losing that aspect of that right and rational. Agrees 100% with all speakers the effect it has on health. We don't pass ordinances to set examples. This ordinance is not preventing anyone between the ages of 18-20 from smoking. It is only preventing this age group from purchasing the product. The responsibility to solve this health issue is not the city's responsibility. Opposes based on principle and on the constitution. It was moved by Councilmember Masters, seconded by Councilmember Laraway to approve ordinance. Councilmember Masters commented in support of Tobacco 21. The young mind does not totally develop until mid-twenties. At age 18, young people do not make rational adult decisions. Acknowledges that this is a state issue. The city should take a lead on this for the importance of the lives of young people. Tobacco industries lobby for young to smoke. Once someone becomes addicted to smoking, it is basically a death sentence. This can be preventable. Education is important. Peer pressure at 18-years-old is a big factor. Waiting will help a lot of young people to not start smoking. Would like our city to be a leader in making this change. Councilmember Johnson commented stating that he has serious reservations of this ordinance change. We are taking away legal rights of the citizens of St. Cloud. Agrees with Mayor Kleis. This is not a role of the Council. Economics are against us. Area cities are not on board. Impact to economy is far beyond cigarettes. Councilmember Goerger commented how difficult this decision is for Council. Understands the issue and understands the health impact. Asks that the people in attendance tonight to go to the state legislature to make this change. Does not see it as a job of the city council. Opposes Tobacco 21. Councilmember Libert commented how bad smoking is for people. Cannot find a place in the council to pass this ordinance. This is a state function. Encourages everyone to talk to state officials. Opposes Tobacco 21. Councilmember Laraway Supports Tobacco 21. This is a health issue and when there is a chance to impact the health of the children, we should not let the opportunity pass. Supports Tobacco 21. Councilmember Hontos commented, does not agree that this is disrespectful to the constitution; Supports Tobacco 21. Councilmember Johnson commented that a referendum should be brought forward and the public should decide. Council President Lewis commented that raising this age is consistent with the drinking age. Not all privileges are given to 18-year-olds. Constitutional issue is wavering. Motion passed 4-3 with Councilmembers Goerger, Libert, and Johnson opposing.

18. A. COMPREHENSIVE PLAN AMENDMENT GUIDING A 7 ACRE PORTION OF 1999 AND 1971 PINE CONE ROAD FROM PUBLIC/SEMI-PUBLIC USE TO MULTIPLE-FAMILY.

B. ORDINANCE REZONING 1999 & 1971 PINE CONE ROAD FROM R2, SINGLE FAMILY AND TWO FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT TO PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT (PUD).

C. RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE PINE CONE ROAD MULTIPLE FAMILY PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT GENERAL DEVELOPMENT PLAN.

Community Development Director Matt Glaesman introduced this item to council. An amendment, rezoning, and adoption of changes to this site to accommodate a 100-unit multi-family building. Planning commission voted to oppose. Item A requires a super majority vote of the Council. Items B and C requires a simple majority vote of the Council. Council President Lewis opened the Public Hearing.

Norma Dalton, 5524 Knollwood Drive, St. Cloud, MN 56303 – lives very close to this site. No buffer zone. Pine Cone Road is not designed for the increase of traffic. Park nearby and concerns of children cutting through her property. Church needs the land for parking, not for an apartment complex. Opposes rezoning and development.

Bruce Ellingson, 5522 Knollwood Drive, St. Cloud, MN 56303 – St. Cloud ranked last in previous census for homeownership in the state compared to cities of equal size. This is about building a community. In 2015 this site was zoned R-2, now potentially changing. Opposes rezoning and development.

Mickie Pittman-Leyendecker, 1320 Case Lane, St. Cloud, MN 56303 – Rezoning would considerably increase the traffic on Pine Cone Road and Cty Rd 134. Safety a concern. Opposes rezoning and development.

Sonja Estwick, 5246 Center St, St. Cloud, MN 56303 – safety concerns with traffic. Does not make sense to let apartment building. Opposes rezoning and development.

Sara Gangle, 5231 Grouse Court, St. Cloud, 56303 – questions the demand for apartments in the area. Single Family homes are on the rise. Supply equals demand. Rezoning is not consistent with the City's 2015 comprehensive plan. Opposes rezoning and development.

Mike McMullen, 1623 Timberdoodle Dr, St. Cloud, MN 56303 – the city promotes neighborhoods and an apartment complex is not a neighborhood. Requests that councilmembers drive the round-about during peak times.

Joe Torberg, Torberg Construction – requests approval as there continues to be a demand for apartments in our community. Careful consideration was taken for neighboring properties. Personally met with each adjoining homeowner and adjusted plans to include suggestions. Understand concerns, but acknowledge they are seldom realized.

Nate Fish, 5205 Grouse Ct, St. Cloud, MN 56303 – this design is not a design that will handle the traffic. Rezoning will negatively impact the area.

Gary Morgendat, 1125 Cherrywood Ct, St. Cloud, MN 56303 – trojan horse on all of this is low income subsidized housing. Connected to refugee resettlement. Need to represent the people and start listening to them.

Shane Stowe, 5227 Grouse Ct, St. Cloud, MN 56303 – Agrees with the concerns already brought up by others. Opposes rezoning and development.

Council President Lewis closed the public hearing. It was moved by Councilmember Masters, seconded by Councilmember Goerger to approve Item A. Councilmember Masters asked City Engineer Steve Foss if the roundabout can adequately handle the traffic. Pinecone road will eventually exceed 10,000 vehicles a day. Right-of-way is there is accommodate expansion if needed. Infrastructure will be able to handle the traffic. Councilmember Masters inquired on if the city's comprehensive plan to allow. Community Development Director Glaesman indicated that this proposal is consistent with many aspects of the plan. Plan does not mention specific sites. Two drainage ponds will be designed to accommodate the area. Setbacks regarding the homes are appropriate for the site. Garage will provide the buffer rather than a fence. Councilmember Masters inquired from Mr. Torberg on if this building will be used for low-income subsidized housing. Torberg indicated that it will not. This is a higher end apartment building. Councilmember Libert commented on the traffic on Pine Cone. It is a frustrating area to drive. This could be a mess. Will oppose. Councilmember Goerger inquired on how much money Torberg will invest in this building. Torberg indicated \$8-\$10 million. Councilmember Goerger inquired on landscaping and if it has been determined or if it will come at a later date. Glaesman indicated that it is not the exact landscaping plans. Councilmember Goerger inquired on the right-of-way. Foss indicated that 120 feet of right-of-way required. There is potential for takings of homes, but unsure at this time. Councilmember Goerger complimented Torberg. Councilmember Laraway stated he has major concerns regarding the project. Will not support the project. Councilmember Hontos questioned the current zoning to the east of Pine Cone Road. Glaesman confirmed it is zoned for R2 – Single Family. Councilmember Hontos inquired on if the CIP has plans for expanding Pine Cone Road. Glaesman indicated that there are no plans in the next five years. Councilmember Hontos advised that we can't assume that this is going to be an unsafe environment. Councilmember Libert complimented Torberg and suspected that staff will need to purchase at least 4 houses to expand the roundabout area. Not inexpensive. Councilmember Masters inquired on who owns the property. It was confirmed the church district owns the property. Councilmember Masters commended Torberg on the project. Council President Lewis complimented Torberg on the project. Commented on the overabundance of rental housing in the area. Pinecone Road needs to be improved before this project will work.

Motion for Item A - Councilmember Laraway, Johnson, and Libert opposed. Councilmember Hontos, Masters and Goerger approved. Council President Lewis voted to approve and voted to oppose. Super majority vote needed. Motion failed.

It was moved by Councilmember Hontos, seconded by Councilmember Goerger to approve Item B. Motion failed 3-4 with Councilmembers Laraway, Lewis, Johnson, and Libert opposing.

As Items A & B failed, no motion for Item C brought to the floor.

OLD BUSINESS:

19. CONSIDERATION OF CENTRAL PARK AND PAN ADDITION NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENTS (ROLL CALL OF 6 AFFIRMATIVE VOTES REQUIRED).

City Engineer Steve Foss re-introduced this item taking it off the table. It was moved by Councilmember Goerger, seconded by Councilmember Libert to approve. Councilmember Hontos inquired on why this item was taken off the table. Mayor Kleis indicated administration has the authority to do so and council can choose to table item again. Councilmember Hontos inquired on why the sidewalk on 7th Street is placed on the south side rather than on the north side. No continuity. City Engineer Foss indicated that he look at entire neighborhood to determine where to place sidewalk. Foss indicated that this is a recommendation as it seemed to place less of a burden on single family property owners. Councilmember Hontos indicated that it would make more sense to place the sidewalk on the north side. Councilmember Hontos inquired on how city owned land is absorbed in situations like this where the city owns property on the south side. Foss indicated that this will not alter the assessment rates and based on the actual cost per foot for sidewalk. It was moved by Councilmember Hontos to relocate the sidewalk to the north side of the road. Council President Lewis requested the amendment be withdrawn. Councilmember Libert seconded Councilmember Hontos' amendment. Foss requested that we proceed with the final determination at the time when we are reviewing bids and finalizing the design. Encourage Council to stipulate in resolution for city to look at both sides prior to approving final plans. Motion for amendment failed 3-4 with Councilmembers Masters, Laraway, Goerger and Libert opposing. It was moved by Councilmember Hontos to ask staff to bring back feasibility of side walk on the north side. Foss commented that there is a public benefit to moving forward with project. He will provide assurance that the north side will be looked at for a side walk. Councilmember Masters seconded the motion in accordance with Foss' clarification. Motion passes unanimously for amendment. Roll call vote for the consideration of Central Park and Pan Addition neighborhood improvements unanimously passed. Resolution adopted and assigned 2017-11-196.

OPEN DISCUSSION & ANNOUNCEMENTS:

Councilmember Johnson discussed the Lutheran Social Services (LSS) Abstract for FY2018 and the compliance rating is mostly compliant. What this indicates is LSS is not in compliance. Discussed state department warnings for Ethiopia. Concerned about Ethiopia travel concerns of US Citizens. Other abstracts are in full compliance (provides Miami as an example). Discussed "will" and "shall."

Councilmember Johnson discussed the state's ability to withdraw from the refugee program. Not here to promote. Frustrating when legislatures say that they cannot do anything. Tired of politicians telling him that there is nothing they can do. He wants to be involved, not just an observer as LSS is offering. Councilmember Masters commented on LSS's letter to the editor that LSS is opening the December quarterly meeting to interested observers. Also, a public webinar will be open on November 14th regarding the impact of refugee resettlement.

Councilmember Johnson commented that he felt caught off guard regarding Councilmember Goerger's resolution last week. It was moved by Councilmember Johnson, seconded by Councilmember Hontos to approve the resolution titled *Resolution Calling for a Moratorium on Refugee Resettlement Under the Refugee Act of 1980 (8 U.S.C. 1522) Within the City of St. Cloud*. Councilmember Hontos commented that he strongly disagrees with the resolution. He commented that Councilmember Johnson has been treated unfairly. Councilmember Hontos is calling for a better line of communications with LSS and the City Council and suggests that it is time the council starts discussing the important issues impacting our city. Motion failed 1-6 with Libert, Hontos, Laraway, Masters, Lewis and Goerger opposed.

Councilmember Goerger commented on his resolution and because there was confusion on the ending of the October 23, 2017 meeting, he would like to reaffirm his *Resolution in Support of a Just and Welcoming Community*. It was moved by Councilmember Goerger, seconded by Councilmember Laraway to approve. Councilmember Johnson commented on the receipt of this resolution and the disservice in receiving it just fourteen minutes prior to the vote. Further, Councilmember Johnson commented that other people obviously had a part in writing it and that the entire resolution is nullified as it contains the phrase “not a mandate” within its language. There is a mandate – “shall” and “will” are mandates. Councilmember Goerger responded stating that these are his words as he spoke them on October 23, 2017. Councilmember Hontos commented that the resolution should have been tabled to the next meeting. Councilmember Goerger acknowledged and commented that that is why he is bringing it up at this meeting. Motion passed 6-1 with Johnson opposing.

Mayor Kleis suggested that Council Rules be discussed at the next Study Session, including considering move the open forum to the end of the meeting. Recommended a motion to be made to include on agenda. It was moved by Councilmember Goerger, seconded by Councilmember Masters to include Council Rules discussion on the agenda for next Study Session. Councilmember Johnson inquired on why this is being brought up again as it was voted down previously. Mayor Kleis recommends that it be discussed. Councilmember Hontos commented on Open Forum process and would like the blue cards placed on the screen for councilmembers to see. Further, Open Forum process voted down previously.

Councilmember Johnson would like John Palmer to discuss Roberts Rules. It was moved by Councilmember Masters, seconded by Councilmember Goerger to call to question. Motion passed 6-1 with Councilmember Johnson opposing.

Motion to include Council Rules on the agenda for the next Study Session passed unanimously.
